## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Southeast Florida's population will continue to expand dramatically through at least the year 2025. In fact, the region is forecast to grow by more than 2.5 million new residents. Cur-

rent growth policies have accommodated population increases by developing lands next to the Florida Everglades. But the consequences of this decision are visible. The Everglades have been brought to the breaking point, future regional water supplies have been endangered, economic resources have been

directed away from our urban communities, and our quality of life has been severely reduced. Nevertheless, the anticipated growth in our population provides a unique opportunity to promote development that complements local redevelopment initiatives.

This report begins in the future with a look back from the year 2025. Returning to the present day, the report then highlights some of Southeast Florida's most innovative local

revitalization efforts and the positive examples they can provide. Market opportunities for smart growth and redevelopment are discussed. And finally, the report discusses ways to measure success and involve others.
